Monitoring Visits: Cape Town (19-20 November) and Uganda (20-29 January 2020)

The scheduled visit provided an excellent opportunity to review participant files, recap trial procedures and undertake routine lab and pharmacy checks. The team have enrolled a number of participants since the second recruitment site opened at Khayelitsha District Hospital in July 2019, so there was plenty to do. As always, thanks go to UCT colleagues who ensured that everything ran smoothly.

Lumbar Puncture Workshop at BHP: Saturday 2 November

Lumbar Puncture Workshop on Saturday 2 November as part of
the BHP Myth Buster Series.

It provided a great opportunity to discuss the myths and mistruths surrounding the administration of lumbar punctures (LPs). It also provided a safe platform to address the concerns that many patients express prior to receiving an LP.



Workshop attendees included a chief, church leaders, teachers, expert patients, HIV advocates, researchers, medical professionals and community advisory board members.

Attendees were even treated to a lab tour by one of BHP's laboratory scientists, Kwana Lechiile, who gave first-hand explanations of the lab tests that are conducted on the cerebrospinal fluid that is taken during an LP.



Nabila and the BHP team hope to capitalise upon the success of this event to organise additional public engagement workshops in the near future. Feedback from attendees indicated that further, similar events would be useful and well received by the local community. In the meantime, plans are underway to produce some information leaflets and videos for patients.
