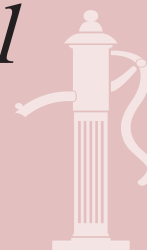


Pumphandle Lecture 2011

"Epidemiology for the Bottom Billion - where there is not even a pump handle to remove!" Hans Rosling

Thursday 8th September – 5:15 pm

John Snow Hall, London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine



Professor Hans Rosling trained in statistics and then medicine at Uppsala University in Sweden, receiving his medical degree in 1974. After further training in public health at St Johns Medical College in Bangalore, India, and in international aid and disaster relief, and in nutrition and tropical medicine in Sweden, he worked as a District Medical Officer in northern Mozambique from 1979 to 1981. While in Mozambique he came across a new disease, called "konzo" by local people, to which he devoted ten years of research, tracking outbreaks of the disease in poor rural areas of five countries of Africa. His collaborations ranged from economics to plant genetics, and traced the causes of the disease to a combination of malnutrition and high dietary intake of cyanide from natural toxins in bitter cassava roots.

He taught postgraduate courses at Uppsala from 1983 to 1996, and then moved to a professorship at the Karolinska Institute in Stockholm, where he was Head of the Division of International Health from 2001 to 2006. Over this period he developed a unique method of presenting data on complex patterns and trends, for which he has become internationally famous, and which he has presented to many audiences, including at the UN, the Davos World Economic Forum and TED lectures. He now divides his time between the Karolinska and the Gapminder Foundation which he set up with his son and daughter-in-law, developing the www.gapminder.org website which is visited by more than 2 million people annually. He was listed as one of 100 leading global thinkers by Foreign Policy Magazine in 2010.

The Lecture will be followed by the Society's Annual General Meeting, to be held at the John Snow Public House (at the corner of Broadwick and Cambridge Streets, in Soho), to which all are invited....

Pumphandle Lecture 2010

"Sapiens, Synergy, Solidarité, Success"

Society members and guests assembled in the John Snow Lecture Theatre last September 8th for a stimulating set of 'S' topics from our 18th Pumphandle Lecturer, Dr. David Nabarro. Dr. Nabarro's wide ranging career in international health has included leading Roll Back Malaria and Health Action in Crises for the WHO and coordinating work on influenza and global food security for the UN.

The intriguing title related to his theme of describing how organizations, such as the WHO and UN, approach the many-faceted challenges of a "pluri-polar world", through informed judgment (sapience), seeking a whole better than the sum of different parts (synergy), commitment to equity (solidarité) and tracking the progress of defined outcomes (success). A tall order and with ambitious goals, such as halving the proportion of people with income less than \$1 a day, or those who suffer from hunger, by 2015. Such targets, set at the Millennium, cannot be achieved by 'business as usual', nor, on current trends, by 2015: but the goals have allowed development of a framework to divide a seemingly impossible task into smaller, achievable segments. Using the Global Food Security Crisis strategy as his main example, Dr. Nabarro cited the use of low cost interventions, coordinated across different national programmes in agriculture, social protection, health and education.

The 'SUN' (Scaling-up Nutrition) initiative engages the various organizations and sponsors through showing economic benefit from investment in nutrition as well as in basic hygiene and capacity development. The detail involves more 'S's to convert concepts into tangible results, for example solid support from stakeholders, sound operational scale and sustainable funding. Far from simple in practice, but he was able to report progress with interventions such as maternal schooling in Brazil, community based nutrition schemes in Ethiopia, doubling of iodized salt consumption in Senegal and decreased childhood anaemia in Peru. Support for any country requires a "demonstrated willingness to act", so part of the task is in assessing both severity of a country's problem and how to develop readiness to work with the multi-level planning involved. At the international level this also means a greater commitment to global advocacy and action.

Working through the steps involved, Dr. Nabarro acknowledged the current gaps in helping people and their countries through this eminently logical framework. Just as reliable sanitation and safe water supply require much more than removal of a pumphandle (it took around another 50 years in the UK), this talk demonstrated that small steps are important in the "road map" to sustainability. Success may depend not just on coordinating these steps but making sure international leaders notice and invest in them. In our not so wise and uncoordinated world, the 'SUN' initiative gives hope of progress. The slides from Dr. Nabarro's superb lecture are available on the Society's website.

Snow talked to the society about his upbringing in York, his medical apprenticeships in Newcastle and his life as a London doctor. He explained his tireless work in the field of epidemiology and his hope that soon he would have definitive proof that Cholera is a waterborne disease.

Dr Snow admirably took questions from all the Miasma theorists in the room and fought his case well, though whether anyone was convinced by his outlandish and implausible theories has yet to be seen.

David has been looking for an opportunity to dress up as John Snow for many years. He is waiting eagerly for the call from Hollywood inviting him to take the lead in 'John Snow: The Movie'.

Nordic Chapter report

The Nordic Chapter of the John Snow Society held its 2011 general assembly in Drammen, Norway in June during the Norwegian Drinking Water Conference. This is arranged every second year in between the Nordic Drinking Water Conferences.

The Chapter gave its 2011 Pumphandle Award to Ivar D. Kalland, former director of the Bergen Water and Sewage Works, for his outstanding and enthusiastic work to promote good and safe drinking water with special focus on security and emergency preparedness in Norway, and for his contributions to the International Water Association.

During more than 30 years Ivar Kalland worked out 4 masterplans for the development of the water supply system of Bergen, and has been in charge of building one of Norway's most advanced and resilient drinking water systems.

He has contributed enthusiastically in development of Norwegian Water, the National Association in the water sector, and has been a member of the National Committee of the IWA. He has been recognized for his resolute and skilled handling of the waterborne outbreak of giardiasis which occurred in Bergen in 2004. This year's Nordic Pumphandle awardee is an evaluated, respected and honored member of the Norwegian and Scandinavian drinking water sector, widely known for his knowledge determination and good sense of humour.

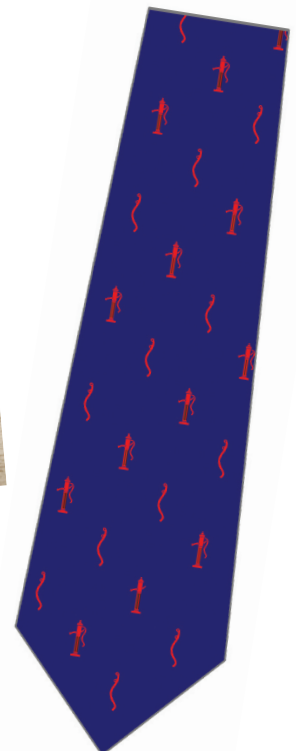
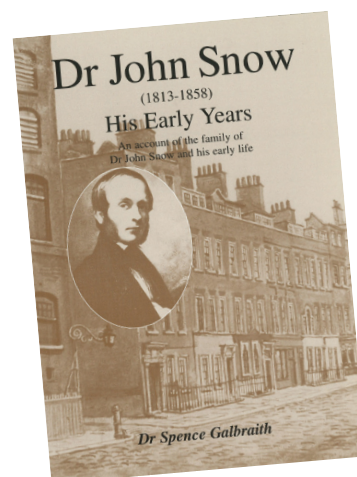

Nominations sought from enthusiasts

According to our constitution, the society's policies are set by a Steering Committee, and proposals are placed before the Annual General Meeting, which takes place at the Pub, following the annual Pumphandle Lecture.

Current Committee members are: Prof Paul Fine (Hon Pumphandle President), Dr Ros Stanwell Smith (Hon Pumphandle Secretary), Prof Sandy Cairncross, Dr Mary O'Mahony, Prof Jimmy Whitworth, Dr Dilys Morgan, Dr John Watson, Dr Adrian Padfield, Prof Andy Hall, Dr Sabine Gabrysch. Members are appointed for three years, terms are staggered, and at least two current members step down each year (SC and JWh in 2011). Members standing down may put themselves forward for re-election.

Nominations are invited for membership on the Committee. Only Society members in good standing (with an intact mug*) are eligible. A valid nomination will consist of a statement of no more than 54 words by the nominee, indicating eagerness to serve and vision for the Society. Nominations received by the Society's secretariat (dhunter@rsph.org.uk) by 1st September will be eligible for vote at the AGM.
