

## Kettering General Hospital Star recruiter

I find that it does help if the consultants are on board with the study or are involved in the study as this makes the pathway a lot easier.

Patient RV24003 was screened in May 2015, patient 004 was screened in June 2015. Dr Hogrefe would have already discussed the study with the patients when he saw them in clinic.

They were then added to the screening log and reviewed and discussed at our weekly research meeting held on a Monday afternoon. The DSEs are requested or if done the results were chased up, the results were reviewed once they were available. We have a good relationship with the consultant in charge of the DSEs so we tend to get the report back ASAP. The angios were then reviewed again, the study nurse arranges for the patient to return for an appointment with the consultant and herself to further discuss the study. If the patient is happy we take consent and randomise on the same day or if they need to further discuss with their relatives we call them back in two days and arrange another appointment if they are happy.

Mostly the consultants will pick these patients up in their clinics, we sometimes get referrals from the ECHO department and also when the patients present in the Cardiac Centre for PPCI or elective angio.
