As we did not have a newsletter in January, this edition covers progress in December and January.



LSHTM Clinical Trials Short Course

The Medical Statistics Department (MSD) at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine (LSHTM) will be running a short course in clinical trials.

This course provides attendees with a clear understanding of the fundamental principles of Randomised Clinical Trials (RCTs). Lectures and practical sessions cover the key issues to be considered in design, conduct, analysis and reporting, with a focus on major clinical trials which directly influence clinical practice. Topics are addressed with perspectives from both public sector research and the pharmaceutical industry.

The course is relevant to those who are keen to gain an understanding of the rigorous evaluation of interventions in health care including clinical research professionals, research managers and other scientists with an interest in clinical trials.

Places on the course are limited.

The course runs for 5 days from the 13th to 17th June 2016.

The course is awaiting approval by the UK Royal College of Physicians for Continuing Professional Development (CPD) credits.

FAQ

Q. How do you deal with patients that have their mind set on one treatment or another?

A. Patients will sometimes have a preference for the treatment that they want but this is often based on what they have heard from friends



and family. Patients need and want information to help them make the right choice. One important fact to get across is that this group would not get PCI if they are not in the trial as it is not a proven treatment for heart failure. If after talking to the patient and explaining their options, the patient is still set on a specific treatment, it is recommended not to include the patient as there is a greater chance they will withdraw if they are disappointed with their allocation.

REVIVED has had some ups and downs over the past 6 months. Recruitment in September and October 2015 was slower than expected but this was thought to be because of a delayed effect from summer. There seems to have been an improvement from this through December and January. Thanks for your hard work in restarting recruitment at your site and renewed promotional efforts.
